When we look at the environmental and solidarity backlash of 2025, we realize that 2024 was not such a bad year after all. Yet, it had already shown clear signs of disengagement: the rise of extremist parties driven by a binary worldview; the dismantling and suspension of key deforestation laws in France and Europe; the spread of ecosystem-destroying projects for market interests; techno-solutionism backed by the rise of Al as a near-deity... The old world is resisting, throwing all its weight behind maintaining economic development that benefits only part of the global population.

However, this world is unsustainable. Even if scientists, social entrepreneurs, and civil society actors are silenced, marginalized, discredited, or underfunded... the more we cross the planetary boundaries, the more we endanger humanity's ability to live happily and in harmony on this Earth ecosystem.

Planète Urgence must therefore adapt to this new context and continue to act in the most fair, useful, and sustainable way possible—no matter the headwinds or challenges. Reconciliation between people and forests is at the heart of the solution to shift towards a sustainable society. Forests are the second-largest carbon sink in the world and essential to the water cycle—for example, the Amazon is a sine qua non condition for the rainfall irrigating farmland across Latin America. Forests also host 80% of terrestrial biodiversity.

Our advantage is that forests and living systems are the best and least expensive technology for storing carbon, regulating the weather, sheltering and multiplying biodiversity, protecting humans from natural disasters, and feeding them. All they need is space and time. That is why Planète Urgence does not just plant trees—it supports a hundred organizations working in forest territories to become more autonomous. It trains thousands of farmers

and local managers to change their practices and raises awareness among tens of thousands of children and adults so they can understand, love, and protect nature—whether near home or halfway across the globe.

Thank you to all citizens in France and in our field areas who commit alongside us; to our ambassadors; our financial and institutional partners; our governance; and all our teams across our 8 countries of operation. The Planète Urgence family is rich in all the energy, skills, and trust of this collective.

Planète Urgence demonstrates at the local level that this reconciliation is not only possible but likely the most desirable outcome. We will celebrate our 25th anniversary in 2025. We had hoped that, 25 years after our founding, our work would no longer be necessary, but the current context calls on us to continue sowing hope and solidarity. Because tomorrow is written in every new day of action and connection between us.

The future of forests and people is inseparable — it must be shaped together.

RECONCILING PEOPLE AND FORESTS

Planète Urgence, a member of Groupe SOS, is an international solidarity and development NGO founded in 2000 and recognized as a public-interest organization.

Faced with accelerating social and environmental challenges, the NGO believes that people must be at the heart of environmental solutions. Its mission is to empower women and men to preserve forests and biodiversity.

Through its volunteer programs, capacity-building initiatives, awareness campaigns, and forest conservation projects, its goal is to empower each individual to be a key agent of their own development and that of their community, grounded in preserved forests and biodiversity.

The NGO operates directly through field teams in the world's three major tropical forest basins—the Amazon, the Congo Basin, and the Borneo-Mekong Basin—where deforestation is most intense, biodiversity most exceptional, and human vulnerabilities most pronounced.

It also relies on citizen engagement, notably via the "Congé Solidaire®" (Solidarity Leave) volunteering program.

Over two decades of work in more than 15 countries, Planète Urgence has developed a global, comprehensive, and pragmatic approach to social and environmental challenges, enabling the implementation of concrete, locally grounded projects. This is why Planète Urgence partners with NGOs that are already active on the ground and have deep knowledge of local needs.

Every project implemented by Planète Urgence follows three core lines of action:

Protecting forests and endangered biodiversity
 Because forests are the most efficient carbon sinks

and home to the richest terrestrial biodiversity, Planète Urgence protects them where they are most threatened

- Promoting the development of local communities
 Because protecting forests and biodiversity must involve those who live alongside them, Planète Urgence works closely with local communities to support their development.
- Raising environmental awareness

Because harmony between people and nature cannot be achieved without changing perceptions and behaviors, Planète Urgence raises environmental awareness

Our mission remains the same: working hand-in-hand with local communities, partner organizations, and governments to implement sustainable forest protection, reforestation, awareness, and fair economic development initiatives.

OUR APPROACH

INTERVENING WHERE URGENCY STRIKES FOR FORESTS AND PEOPLE

Planète Urgence operates through a territorial approach, in close collaboration with local partners and grounded field expertise, aligned with national and local public policies to address a clearly identified and documented need.

To ensure proximity and deep understanding of local contexts and challenges, the NGO relies on delegations established in its countries of operation.

Planète Urgence has defined three key criteria to prioritize its intervention areas and ensure action where both forests and communities face the greatest urgency:

High deforestation rates

Exceptional biodiversity

Severe human vulnerability

As such, we are currently active in the three major tropical forest basins: the Congo Basin, the Borneo-Mekong Basin, and the Amazon







Planète Urgence sought to develop a more detailed, country-by-country analysis framework, and therefore partnered with Resilient Landscapes, a branch of CIFOR-ICRAF focused on landscape investment projects. The goal: to collect and analyze data for Ecuador, Benin, Madagascar, and Indonesia to identify priority restoration zones. Resilient Landscapes leveraged current public data as well as tools and knowledge from 45 years of CIFOR-ICRAF research, the world's leading organization dedicated to terrestrial natural capital research.

Planète Urgence ensured these studies were made publicly available free of charge, so they can be used by local authorities, civil society organizations, and donors seeking to contribute to the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration, in which Planète Urgence is an active participant.

We adopt a pragmatic and holistic approach to address the challenges in our intervention territories—because within an ecosystem, everything is interconnected. Our actions often intertwine education, economic activity, governance, conservation, and restoration.

LOCAL CIVIL SOCIETY AT THE HEART OF OUR WORK

Our approach always includes an assessment of our partners' needs. This helps us design tailored support plans that strengthen the organizational foundations of each Civil Society Organization (CSO). In this regard, volunteering is a powerful lever for transformation. When it comes to capacity building, volunteering is not our only tool. We also rely on the power of collectives, through networking and peer-to-peer learning. This approach will be further reinforced in 2025 through the RACINE project.

Our ambition: to contribute to the emergence of a strong, well-structured civil society, capable of driving forward forest and biodiversity protection agendas..

PLANÈTE URGENCE IN BENIN

Established in 2004, this was Planète Urgence's first international office. Located in Djougou, northwestern Benin, it is run by a dedicated team of six. With forest cover in Benin having decreased by nearly 20% between 2005 and 2020, the delegation—led by Daniel Chabi-Boni—works alongside local partners to address this environmental emergency. Its work includes volunteer deployment and support to volunteering missions in Togo..

Key projects:

- · Planète Éducation: Raising environmental awareness among young generations.
- \cdot GAPADOU: Protecting sacred forests in the Bassila and Djougou regions.

PLANÈTE URGENCE IN CAMBODIA

Although two-thirds of Cambodia are covered by tropical forests, these ecosystems are severely threatened by deforestation. Since 2013, Planète Urgence has worked in the country through this delegation—led by Apollinaire Leheutre—partnering with local organizations to safeguard these crucial habitats. Activities include volunteer missions and capacity building for local CSOs involved in environmental protection.

PLANÈTE URGENCE IN CAMEROON

Created in 2008, the Cameroon delegation operates from Yaoundé and has a field office in Douala. Cameroon is home to 10% of Congo Basin forests, the second largest tropical rainforest in the world. Yet these forests remain under major threat. Led by René Noungang, the six-person team supports local partners through volunteering and forest conservation initiatives.

Key projects:

- · CAMERR: Mangrove restoration in Douala.
- · FARE: Agroforestry solutions in the north.
- · RACINE: Civil society capacity strengthening.

PLANÈTE URGENCE IN ECUADOR

Present in Ecuador since 2019, the delegation is committed to protecting the country's remarkable biodiversity—home to over 18,000 plant species and 20% of global bird diversity. Facing widespread deforestation, the delegation works with local partners and deploys volunteers. Legally registered in 2024, it aims to become a strategic hub for Planète Urgence's activities across the Amazon region.

PLANÈTE URGENCE IN INDONESIA

Founded in 2006, the Indonesia office is based in Samarinda (Borneo) and operates a second office in Labuan. Indonesia hosts the third-largest tropical forest basin and 3.2 million hectares of mangroves. Deforestation is advancing rapidly—over 12% of forest lost since 2002.

Led by Reonaldus Praembanan and a team of 15, the delegation implements two major projects:

- · MAHAKAM in Kalimantan
- · MERCI in West Java

Since 2024, volunteering missions have resumed in Indonesia thanks to the legal recognition of the delegation as Yayasan Planet Urgensi Indonesia. This evolution strengthens field activities and mangrove conservation, with missions designed to transfer essential skills to local partners.


PLANÈTE URGENCE IN MADAGASCAR

Active since 2006, the Madagascar office operates from the capital and several field sites. The island—the world's fifth largest—boasts unique biodiversity, much of it endemic, but severely threatened by deforestation and ecosystem degradation.

Under Herizo Andrianaivosoa's leadership, a team of 55 works alongside local partners to protect this natural heritage. Volunteers are deployed, and four major projects are implemented:

- DIABE and TAPIA (Itasy region): Sustainable firewood production and local forest governance.
- · MOSOTRY (Sofia region): Mangrove restoration in remote areas.
- · Planète Éducation: Environmental awareness among youth

OUR IMPACT

Planète Urgence's mission is to reconcile people and nature by empowering communities to live with dignity while protecting their environment. Among all threatened ecosystems, we have chosen to focus on forests. Our intervention zones are selected both for their ecological importance and human vulnerability, as the causes of deforestation are deeply tied to socio-economic issues.

Our action therefore integrates these complex relationships and is tailored to each local context, as reflected in our FO.RE.T strategy: Forests, Resilience, and Territories.

Our methodology aligns with the principles of Forest Landscape Restoration (FLR), combining local development, reforestation, and environmental education through a holistic, integrated lens. We place local actors at the center of our interventions, making them the sustainable drivers of development in their own countries.

Project beneficiaries are fully involved in decisions and activities that concern them. We prioritize delegation of funding and implementation to local associations, whom we support and accompany.

Our goal is to contribute to several strongly interdependent impacts:

Support sustainable economic alternatives

adapted to local contexts and compatible with natural resource protection—contributing to food security and resilience.

Strengthen community knowledge and relationships

with their natural environments, enhancing their ability to protect ecosystems and reinforcing governance

Reduce drivers of deforestation and restore degraded areas by fostering endemic biodiversity and contributing to climate change mitigation and adaptation

Through our work, Planète Urgence **directly and measurably contributes** to 10 of the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).





















A COMPASS FOR OUR IMPACTS

Planète Urgence has drawn on its field experience and its exchanges with other NGOs, researchers, and forest experts to create a "wheel of necessary changes" for a given territory in order to reconcile Humans and Forests.

Depending on the context and available resources, projects focus on specific outcomes with refined indicators. Project implementation and monitoring are therefore adapted to the territory's context. For instance, in some areas, the project will mainly work on improving forest cover to slow down deforestation, while in others, restoration will be prioritized. The organization is currently integrating this approach to project design, monitoring, and impact measurement across all its initiative.





A FIELD ACTOR IN SERVICE OF THE CLIMATE

PLANÈTE URGENCE: A KEY PLAYER FACING THE CLIMATE EMERGENCY

In response to the climate crisis, Planète Urgence takes action to protect ecosystems, particularly forests, which play a vital role in climate regulation and carbon storage. With two decades of expertise in reforestation, sustainable natural resource management, and community empowerment, the organization implements concrete actions to ensure long-lasting impact.

Our approach is grounded in scientific collaboration with researchers, institutions, and local actors. By developing nature-based solutions, Planète Urgence aims to tackle climate challenges while preserving biodiversity and supporting the most vulnerable populations. Its innovative funding model, notably through Climate Philanthropy, enables companies to effectively contribute to the ecological transition.

OUR BELIEFS: ACT NOW AND AT SCALE TO PROTECT OUR FORESTS—THE LUNGS OF THE PLANET

The Paris Agreement sets the goal of limiting warming to 1.5°C. While annual climate finance has more than doubled between 2018 and 2022, it must still be multiplied by five to reach the \$7.4 trillion needed yearly until 2030, according to the Climate Policy Initiative.

This figure may seem huge, but inaction would cost far more: projected economic losses by 2100 could be five times greater.

While companies are rightly focused on reducing their direct emissions and those from their value chains, they also need to go further by supporting the decarbonization of other sectors and protecting carbon sinks

According to the United Nations, ecosystem restoration could account for up to one-third of the effort required to address the climate crisis.

By supporting Planète Urgence and similar initiatives, companies can take meaningful action to protect carbon sinks and restore ecosystems. Among nature-based solutions, forests play a central role. Thanks to photosynthesis and rich soil systems, they absorb and store carbon, making them the second largest carbon sink after oceans.

Forests are also central to biodiversity protection and human development. They host 80% of terrestrial biodiversity (IPBES, 2019) and sustain 250 million people living in extreme poverty nearby (FAO, 2020). Any effective climate strategy must therefore combine biodiversity conservation with reducing inequality, to ensure sustainable and fair impact.

SCIENCE-BASED COMMITMENT DRIVING ACTION

En 2024, Planète Urgence a renforcé son approche scientifique pour mieux comprendre et préserver les écosystèmes. Sur le terrain, l'organisation a mené sa première étude de scénario de référence d'inventaire forestier, établissant une base de comparaison essentielle pour évaluer l'impact de ses projets de restauration et de conservation. Les équipes du projet en question ont parcouru plus de 60 transects et mesuré le diamètre ainsi que la hauteur de plus de 2 000 arbres, collectant des données cruciales pour suivre l'évolution des forêts.

En parallèle, la recherche scientifique joue un rôle clé dans l'approfondissement des connaissances et l'optimisation des actions de terrain. Planète Urgence collabore avec des chercheurs renommés pour étudier des enjeux écologiques majeurs. Deux études récentes sont à découvrir sur notre site :

- · One on Pandanus candelabrum, an invasive species;
- Another on the impact of sea level rise on mangrove mortality in the Wouri estuary.



PLANÈTE URGENCE LAUNCHES CLIMATE PHILANTHROPY!

Climate Philanthropy is a new funding tool for climate action, designed by NGOs for companies. It enables companies to directly support climate projects led by NGOs through sponsorship (eligible for tax deductions) while also highlighting the carbon impact of their donations as part of their impact strategies (climate, biodiversity, social).

As an alternative to carbon credits, which are often criticized for their offsetting logic, Climate Philanthropy promotes a systematic and virtuous contribution. It represents a paradigm shift, allowing companies to move from owning carbon credits to a contribution-based approach.

Its objective is to enable companies to engage massively, without reputational risk, in a credible manner and with guaranteed impact.

- No reputational risk: based on a logic of contribution, Climate Philanthropy avoids any confusion with offsetting mechanisms, ensuring transparent and ethical communication.
- Crédible: it combines the virtuous DNA of sponsorship with the technical rigor of carbon finance methodologies. Impact is demonstrated through a 10year carbon contribution report, along with indicators on biodiversity and human development.

In addition, this innovative approach has several advantages:





MORE DIRECT

Without intermediaries, it brings companies closer to the field and the impact, making them co-drivers of the project.



MORE INCLUSIVE

Adaptable to all regions and all project sizes.



MORE PRAGMATIC

Projects are shorter and more manageable in duration (10 years vs. 40 years for carbon credits).



MORE ACCESSIBLE

Companies commit to short-term funding cycles while showcasing impact over 10 years.

Developed by a collective of experts convened by Planète Urgence—including NGOs, companies, researchers, and institutional stakeholders—this initiative has already been tested since 2022 in in Indonesia (mangrove restoration), Madagascar (sustainable firewood) and France (agroforestry).

Open-source and transparent, Climate Philanthropy aims for global deployment. It initially targets reforestation projects, with the ambition to expand to all climate-related initiatives.

A FIELD ACTOR IN SERVICE OF BIODIVERSITY

BIODIVERSITY AT THE HEART OF PLANÈTE URGENCE'S PROJECTS

The biodiversity crisis, including the sixth mass extinction, is of a scale and urgency comparable to climate change. Planète Urgence is already contributing—and intends to do even more—to address local biodiversity loss through its actions.

Our conservation and restoration projects in tropical forest ecosystems—in biodiversity-critical areas such as Cameroon, Madagascar, Indonesia, Benin, and Peruposition Planète Urgence as a credible and committed actor on this issue.

FORESTS: CRITICAL FOR BIODIVERSITY AND CHALLENGING TO FUND

Forests are home to 80% of terrestrial biodiversity, especially tropical forests*. Their biological diversity increases their resilience to climate change and disease.

The Global Biodiversity Framework adopted at the Kunming-Montreal COP includes key targets:

- By 2030, 30% of land areas, particularly those crucial for biodiversity, must be effectively conserved.
- · 30% of degraded ecosystems must be restored to improve biodiversity, ecosystem services, ecological integrity, and connectivity.

To meet these goals, the World Bank estimates that we need to invest \$700 billion per year by 2050 in biodiversity preservation—yet only \$100 billion was spent in 2020.

It is essential to develop financing mechanisms that enable states and companies to contribute, and that provide certified conservation or restoration credits, based on robust scientific methods.

PLANÈTE URGENCE IS AN ACTIVE MEMBER OF BIODIVERSITY NETWORKS

All our forest conservation and restoration projects, which include environmental education, contribute to the Kunming-Montreal 30x30 goal.

To support scaling and sustainable funding, Planète Urgence has joined two key networks:

- IUCN (International Union for Conservation of Nature): the global organization guiding policy and action to protect nature. Planète Urgence is a member of IUCN and the French IUCN Committee.
- OBC (Organization for Biodiversity Certificates): developing, with Carbone 4 and the Natural History Museum, a scientific method to certify biodiversity impact relative to a reference ecosystem.

Planète Urgence plays an active role in these working groups by contributing its field expertise and sharing key learnings—such as at the Climate Chance Summit in Bordeaux. The NGO also supports motions and policy recommendations across a variety of institutional and advocacy platforms.

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PLANÈTE ÉDUCATION

BENIN & MADAGASCAR | ACTIVE SINCE 2022

CONTEXT

In the countries where Planète Urgence operates, environmental education is almost entirely absent from the official curricula of public primary schools. Yet raising awareness about environmental protection is crucial across the African continent, in order to preserve some of the world's richest ecosystems and help communities adapt to climate change. Much of this awareness must happen through schools, which play a vital role in preparing children to become responsible citizens in tomorrow's world. Planète Éducation supports both teachers and students in key forest areas by integrating immersive, hands-on environmental education into school life—helping children understand the issues and become active stewards of their environment.

Objective: Empower local educational stakeholders to engage children in protecting their environment—especially in relation to climate, biodiversity, and forests.

3 KEY ACTIVITIES IN 2024

In partnership with: YIMMA, CPN LES PAPILLONS (Benin), and MMAHARE (Madagascar)

- Tree Day celebrations in Benin, with participation from several schools.
- Participation in a conference organized by the Agence Universitaire de la Francophonie on environmental education for sustainable development (EEDD) in Madagascar.
- Exchange sessions between teachers to share best practices in EEDD.

GAPADOU

BENIN | ACTIVE SINCE 2023

CONTEXT

Sacred forests—protected based on traditional beliefs—are vital forms of natural and cultural conservation. The Republic of Benin has around 2,900 sacred forests. But pressures from population growth, increased demand for farmland and firewood, and widespread poverty in rural villages are accelerating the degradation of these ecosystems.

Following a successful pilot phase in 2023, the GAPADOU project expanded in 2024 to scale up protection efforts.

Objective: Support the conservation and sustainable management of sacred forests in the Bassila and Djougou municipalities.

3 KEY ACTIVITIES IN 2024

In partnership with: BEV ONG – Bien-Être et Vie

- Revitalization of local forest management committees.
- Integration of five public primary schools into the GAPADOU project to raise awareness among teachers and students.
- · Public awareness campaign via radio broadcast.

CAMEROON | ACTIVE SINCE 2022

CONTEXT

The Wouri estuary in Douala is protected by 200,000 hectares of mangroves that help limit flooding and erosion while providing critical biodiversity that supports traditional fishing communities. However, urbanization, illegal logging, fish smoking, and sand and oil extraction are putting these ecosystems at risk.

In response, Planète Urgence and three Cameroonian NGOs have committed to restoring 1,000 hectares of mangroves over five years, with 40 years of monitoring, and the creation of community-managed forests. Awareness campaigns and sustainable livelihood initiatives (such as improved fish-smoking techniques and responsible agriculture) are also being implemented to ease the pressure on mangroves.

Objective: Contribute to the restoration and sustainable management of at least 1,000 hectares of mangrove forest while protecting biodiversity and strengthening the resilience of local communities.

CAMEROON | ACTIVE SINCE 2020

CONTEXT

Launched in 2019 in Northern Cameroon, near Bénoué National Park, the FARE project addresses pressing environmental challenges (poaching, deforestation, illegal fires), social tensions (conflicts between farmers and herders), and economic pressures (desertification, encroachment into the park for agriculture). Led by Cameroonian association CERAF-Nord, with support from Planète Urgence, the project restores degraded wildlife corridors in the Bénoué and Faro parks, promotes cashew tree planting, and trains local producers in improved agricultural and livestock practices. Since 2024, the project also supports processing and marketing of apples and cashew nuts produced through the program.

Objective: Restore ecosystems in Northern Cameroon by replanting wildlife corridors and strengthen the resilience of communities living near the parks by supporting cashew production.

3 KEY ACTIVITIES IN 2024

In partnership with: CERAF-Nord

- Restoring wildlife corridors in the Bénoué and Faro parks through the planting of native species, which also prevent cattle from entering the protected areas
- Planting cashew trees in the fields of farmers living near the parks

CAMEROON | ACTIVE SINCE 2024

CONTEXT

Between 2013 and 2021, Cameroon lost over one million hectares of forest, due to agriculture, timber trade, and other human activities (Global Forest Watch, 2022). Although the country is a key player in forest restoration, local Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) face structural and financial challenges. Donors often favor international NGOs from the Global North (OECD, 2018), which limits the impact of local actors on environmental protection and community resilience.

The RACINE project aims to strengthen the capacities of local CSOs by applying principles of non-competition, co-construction, and sustainability. By doing so, communities can better anticipate climate impacts, adopt resilient farming practices, diversify their income, and improve access to adaptation funding. These stronger local dynamics help empower communities and preserve ecosystems for a sustainable future.

Objective: Reinforce the resilience, autonomy, and capacities of local CSOs working on forest and biodiversity protection to expand and sustain their impact on the planet.

INDONESIA | ACTIVE SINCE 2023

CONTEXT

Indonesia's tropical forest is home to nearly 20% of the world's mangroves, covering about 3.5 million hectares. These ecosystems can store up to 1,000 tons of carbon per hectare, far more than terrestrial forests. Mangroves are also critical habitats for endangered species—such as the proboscis monkey—and provide coastal protection against extreme weather events.

In the Mahakam Delta, however, unsustainable aquaculture has degraded nearly half of the mangrove cover, threatening marine resources and the livelihoods of fishing-dependent communities, where 90% of people rely on fishing to survive.

Objective: Preserve these vital ecosystems by developing sustainable solutions that benefit both nature and local populations.

3 KEY ACTIVITIES IN 2024

In partnership with: YML and POKJA PESSISIR

- A biodiversity survey conducted in March 2024 revealed between 146 and 263 proboscis monkeys (an endangered species), along with crocodiles, monitor lizards, long-tailed macaques (endangered), and silvered langurs (vulnerable)
- Creation of three women's groups (32 members total) focused on coastal food production
- The Provincial Head of Education in Paser called for environmental education to be included in the curriculum—a strong sign of local support for Planète Urgence's awareness efforts.

INDONESIA | ACTIVE SINCE 2022

CONTEXT

The Pandeglang District and Ujung Kulon National Park, located at the western tip of Java Island in Indonesia, are particularly vulnerable to volcanic eruptions, earthquakes, and tsunamis—a situation worsened by high population density and human activities. Mangroves once lined much of the coastline and local rivers, but they have suffered massive degradation due to urbanization, infrastructure expansion, and the rise of aquaculture and tourism. Additionally, the conservation of the Javan rhinoceros is a major concern, with only 74 individuals recorded, making it one of the most endangered mammals in the world. Raising awareness of its protection is therefore essential to ensure the survival of this unique species.

Objective: To raise awareness about the conservation of mangroves and the Javan rhinoceros, restore mangrove ecosystems, and promote sustainable livelihoods for local communities.

3 KEY ACTIVITIES IN 2024

In partnership with Alabama

- 32 teachers trained in environmental education and the use of manuals on mangroves and the Javan rhinoceros.
- The Department of Education aims to integrate the manuals into schools across the district.
- Three groups of women entrepreneurs received training, with some going on to launch businesses focused on processing fishery products.

MADAGASCAR | ACTIVE SINCE 2020

CONTEXT

The project operates in the Analamanga, Itasy, and Alaotra Mangoro regions, located near Madagascar's capital, where over 90% of households rely on wood energy (charcoal and firewood) for cooking.


Wood energy is the primary source of household energy in Madagascar and represents a significant expense in household budgets. Its use leads to massive deforestation of natural forests and/or surrounding plantations, highlighting the urgent need to develop more efficient alternatives in the area.

Objective: To contribute to the sustainable improvement of income and food and nutritional security for rural households involved in and benefiting from the wood-energy value chain—particularly women and children—while also helping to preserve the natural environment in the periurban area of Antananarivo.

3 KEY ACTIVITIES IN 2024

In partnership with AIM, CIRAD, and Partage

- Reforestation campaign over 671 hectares with wood-energy species, including reforestation in agricultural areas through agroforestry models.
- 13-day training sessions for 1,963 charcoal producers (men and women) to learn improved carbonization techniques.

MADAGASCAR | ACTIVE SINCE 2022

CONTEXT

The Red Island is known as one of the world's nine major biodiversity hotspots, due to the many economic and environmental challenges it has faced for many years.

This is particularly true for the Sofia region in the northwest of the country, which is under intense human pressure—such as deforestation of dry forests and mangroves, and overfishing—driven by poverty and migration from the south. In addition, climate change is increasingly affecting these areas through floods, cyclones, and droughts, further increasing community vulnerability.

Objective: To contribute to the restoration of forest ecosystems in the Bay of Loza, in order to better preserve natural resources and improve the living conditions of local communities.

3 KEY ACTIVITIES IN 2024

In partnership with the Regional Directorate of Environment and Sustainable Development of the Sofia Region (DREDD)

- Restoration of mangrove ecosystems over 72 hectares.

CONTEXT

In the Itasy region, Tapia forests are essential to local communities, providing fruits, mushrooms, and medicinal plants. They are also home to an endemic silkworm, whose cocoons are used in textile crafts.


However, deforestation and overexploitation—driven by demand for wood energy and agricultural expansion—are weakening these ecosystems. The VOIs, responsible for managing them, lack the resources to ensure their protection. Population pressure and poverty further exacerbate these threats.

Objective: To strengthen the technical and economic capacities of the VOIs, with a particular focus on women's participation, to support the sustainable management of natural resources.

3 KEY ACTIVITIES IN 2024

In partnership with SAHA and the VOIs

- Reforestation of 300 hectares with wood-energy species
- Initial ministerial approval obtained in April 2024 for the creation of two Community Protected Areas a first step in recognizing the conservation value of the Tapia forest ecosystem

PÉROU | ACTIVE SINCE 2023

CONTEXT

Peru, the second-largest country in the world by area of Amazon rainforest, is facing intense deforestation, with 190,199 hectares lost in 2020—mainly due to slash-and-burn agriculture. The province of Bongará, in the Amazonas region, is particularly affected despite its key role in global biodiversity. At the same time, the local communities of Cuispes, heavily reliant on agriculture, have experienced increased economic hardship following the COVID-19 pandemic. The lack of technical support has led farmers to adopt unsustainable practices, depleting the soil and reducing productivity—especially for coffee, a major crop in the region.

Objective: To preserve forests and biodiversity while supporting farmers in the municipality of Cuispes through the development of shade-grown agroforestry coffee. This project offers a sustainable alternative to agriculture and extensive livestock farming, improves local incomes, and raises community awareness of environmental protection. It also includes an environmental education component, the development of ecotourism to showcase natural wealth, and the creation of a conservation area to ensure the long-term protection of local ecosystems.

OUR HIGHLIGHTS

THE CLIMATE CHANCE SUMMIT IN BORDEAUX AND THE ISSUE OF "BIODIVERSITY CREDITS"



At the Climate Chance Summit in Bordeaux in March 2024, Planète Urgence took part in an expert panel on biodiversity financing. Our Executive Director, Amandine Hersant, shared the NGO's perspective alongside leaders from EcoAct, West Africa Blue, WWF, and legal expert Matthieu Wemaere.

The debate highlighted contrasting views on the monetisation of biodiversity—some seeing it as a key lever to unlock funding, while others voiced concerns. As biodiversity credits and certificates are still under development within an unclear regulatory framework, it is crucial to increase dedicated funding while avoiding the pitfalls of carbon markets.

Planète Urgence is actively committed to ensuring that such funding genuinely benefits nature conservation.

CIFOR-ICRAF WEBINAR (CENTER INTERNATIONAL FORESTRY RESEARCH)



In April 2024, Planète Urgence and the Resilient Landscapes team at CIFOR-ICRAF co-hosted a webinar to present research conducted in Benin, Madagascar, Ecuador, and Indonesia. By combining data on biodiversity, deforestation, climate, and human vulnerabilities, the studies identified priority areas for forest and mangrove restoration.

With a goal of coordinating restoration efforts, Planète Urgence and CIFOR-ICRAF shared their analysis during this event, which brought together NGOs, scientists, donors, and institutions. Supported and broadcast by the Global Mangrove Alliance and the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration, this webinar marked a key milestone to scale up impact and strengthen our actions.

THE MONTH OF CORPORATE VOLUNTEERING: A GROWING VEHICLE FOR ENGAGEMENT



Launched in 2021 by Planète Urgence, the Month of Corporate Volunteering (MDVE) aims to raise awareness among employees, as well as HR and CSR managers, about the opportunities offered by the Congé Solidaire® program.

The 2024 edition marked a new milestone with a largescale campaign to promote this program among businesses and the general public. From October 28 to November 3, a metro ad campaign in Paris spotlighted the Congé Solidaire®, made possible thanks to a strategic partnership with Mediatransports, the creativity of Saatchi & Saatchi, and the valuable support of France Volontaires.

Through this campaign, Planète Urgence transformed the idea of "taking a holiday" into a concrete opportunity for environmental and social action. By cleverly repurposing traditional holiday slogans, the campaign's bold messages encouraged companies and employees to commit to high-impact missions, such as adult education and biodiversity protection. We are pleased to announce that in 2024, several public institutions renewed their commitment to support us. These funds enable large-scale implementation across three key territories.

EXPERTISE IN ENVIRONMENTAL PRESERVATION AND RESTORATION



Global Mangrove Alliance

In 2023, Planète Urgence joined the GMA. The goal is to leverage collective expertise to reduce mangrove loss, improve restoration efforts, and double the protection of mangrove ecosystems.



International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN)

In 2023, Planète Urgence joined the IUCN, a global authority composed of more than 1,400 governmental and civil society organizations and 15,000 experts. It leads global efforts to assess the status of the natural world and identify the actions needed to safeguard it.



United Nations Decade on Ecosystem Restoration

Our inclusion in the UN Decade aims to help us gain expertise, notably by sharing best practices with other committed actors, to improve the impact and quality of our projects in the field.

Planète Urgence is an active member of the Coalition Éducation, which promotes access to sustainable development education for everyone. Since 2023, we have been part of the organization's Board of Directors, allowing us to highlight the link between education and environmental challenges.

EXPERTISE IN CAPACITY BUILDING



France Volontaires: Promoting and Developing International Exchange and Solidarity Volunteering

Since June 2021, Planète Urgence and France Volontaires have been partners in strengthening collaboration around a shared vision of volunteering as a tool for capacity building and greater impact.



DONORS

In France, public generosity toward NGOs slightly declined due to inflation, but citizen engagement remains strong. The share of small donations (under €150) slightly decreased, while automatic monthly donations grew by 4.3%, now accounting for 45% of total donations* (*source: France Générosités)

At Planète Urgence, we saw a similar trend in 2024. Although environmental causes are currently ranked below humanitarian and social emergencies, we were able to raise +33% more than in 2023, thanks to strong partnerships and a loyal donor base.

Supporting Planète Urgence means effectively supporting projects that preserve endangered forests and biodiversity. It's also the best way to protect and assist local communities in their fight against deforestation and ensure they retain diverse, sustainable livelihoods.

Whether you're a one-time donor or a regular supporter, donating directly or through our partners, your generosity is vital—not only for implementing our projects but also for supporting our field teams.

We are proud to have received increased public support, representing 8% of Planète Urgence's total fundraising in 2024. This is largely thanks to regular donors, whose ongoing contributions offer vital financial stability for our NGO.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to every single one of Planète Urgence's donors who contributed—each in their own way—to our projects in 2024.



Support Planète Urgence



After a strong launch in 2023, the partnership with the solidarity fundraising platform TRIBEE took off in 2024, raising nearly €130,000 from 3,585 contributors who chose Planète Urgence among 12 participating associations.

The concept? It's an online platform that allows users to create solidarity-based fundraising pages for events or group gifts, with 5% of the total amount donated to partner NGOs like Planète Urgence.

TRIBEE has now become one of the main tools for public fundraising at Planète Urgence. All donations directly support the organization's mission, particularly projects focused on sacred forest conservation in Benin and its Planète Education environmental awareness program.

LAUNCH OF THE FOREST ANGEL PROGRAM

Mangroves are much more than forests.
They capture carbon, shelter extraordinary
biodiversity, protect coastlines and
communities, and provide livelihoods for
thousands of people.

Yet, despite their critical role in climate action, they remain underfunded—especially by the general public.

To address this gap, Planète Urgence launched an innovative philanthropic investment program: the Forest Angel initiative. In its first phase, 12 philanthropists joined the adventure, closely engaging with the organization.

Their non-financial return on investment is measured in hectares restored, carbon sequestered, and micro-entrepreneurs supported in our intervention areas.

VOLUNTEERS, AMBASSADORS

Planète Urgence is supported by a network of volunteers—former participants who have been transformed by their missions with our local partners and who are eager to share their experiences and raise awareness about Planète Urgence within their personal and professional circles.

ACTIONS OF THE PLANÈTE SOLIDAIRE NETWORK

The network of ambassadors, called "Planète Solidaire," is built to last. It gathers monthly and comes together once a year for a Forum aimed at strengthening team spirit and cohesion. Depending on their availability and interests, members commit to supporting the Planète Urgence team in its missions and increasing the visibility of the association throughout the country.

In 2024, around ten local events were organized, including:

- Facilitation at Run for Planet races (Planète Urgence partner),
- · Participation in the Cap Martinique transatlantic sailing race under Planète Urgence's banner,
- · Photo exhibitions and mission-related conferences.

 And remote training sessions for field teams on basic digital tools.

Beyond these activities, every ambassador is invited to contribute according to their own skills and interests:

- · Lead a Climate Fresk workshop
- · Act as a corporate liaison within partner companies
- Mentor new volunteers
- · Facilitate discussion groups
- · Participate in strategic planning
- · Develop new partnerships
- Support with specific tasks (translation, accounting, logistics, strategy, etc.)
- And of course, share news and promote fundraising campaigns


FINANCIAL REPORT

ACTIVITY LEVEL REMAINS STABLE AND CONFIRMS THE ASSOCIATION'S POSITIVE MOMENTUM DESPITE AN UNCERTAIN ENVIRONMENT FOR OFFICIAL DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE

Planète Urgence's 2024 operating budget amounted to €5,776,000 (excluding earmarked funds), representing a 2% increase compared to 2023. This moderate growth follows a phase of more significant expansion in previous years. Nevertheless, it reflects the organization's ability to maintain a steady level of activity in a context of uncertainty—particularly regarding public donor subsidies. The year 2024 was marked by the launch of a capacity-building project in Cameroon, made possible by the renewed confidence of both public and private donors.


After substantial growth between 2020 and 2023, Planète Urgence maintained a budget (excluding earmarked funds) of $5.776 \, \mathrm{M} \odot$.



Our revenue sources are highly diversified, contributing to our financial resilience.


- \cdot 71% of our budget is funded by companies and individual donors,
- \cdot while the remaining 29% comes from public and international institutions (such as the French Development Agency, Fonjep, France Volontaires, and the European Union).

It's worth noting that the share of the budget allocated to social missions decreased slightly to 80%, compared to 82% in 2023. This change is linked to the launch of structuring projects, which are accounted for as operational costs. As a result, the proportion allocated to administrative and fundraising costs increased from 18% to 20%
